
HBCU Business Roundtable Student Summit

The purpose of the Parity Project Innovation Challenge is to encourage solutions to how science or technology can be used to achieve economic parity for Black America. Winners receive cash prizes and an all-expenses-paid invitation to the Base 11 Grand Prize Showcase—including the opportunity to present their ideas to executives and industry game changers from some of the most influential organizations across America, including visits to the challenge partners at J.P. Morgan Chase and The Executive Leadership Council. The students were encouraged by Prof. Michele Dugar to enter the competition.

HBCU Battle of the Brains

Three Burroughs students participated in the 7th annual Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCU) Battle of the Brains (HBCU BOTB), March 8 through March 12, 2023 in Austin, TX, where the National Football League served as the title sponsor of the event.

HBCU BOTB pits teams of the best and brightest STEM and Business students from HBCUs across the country against each other as they compete for more than \$50,000 in scholarships. Each team has 24 hours to develop a solution to a proposed business challenge, and make their pitch live in front of an audience. They are judged on analysis, a business/technology solution, a presentation and Q&A, with crowd participation constituting one of the final votes.

"Showcasing the immensely talented students that populate our nation's HBCUs has been a central focus of the HBCU Battle of the Brains," said Gregory Gibson, Founder and Executive Director, HBCU BOTB."

Executives from the various sponsors are on hand during the fourday event, providing guidance and support for participants in a variety of roles including featured speakers, team mentors, and competition judges.

Hosted by HBCU Battle of the Brains, LLC, the competition is designed to support the mission of HBCUs by promoting talented business and STEM students within the African American community, as well as the technology industry, in an engaging and dynamic way.



Honda Campus All-Star Challenge

Michael Dawson, a senior business administration (management) from Orlando, Florida, was a member of the Benedict College Team that competed in the 34th Honda

Campus All-Star Challenge (HCASC) National Championship Tournament.

HCASC, America's premier

academic competition among HBCUs established in 1989, annually brings together more than 250 HBCU students, coaches, presidents, and institutional representatives for a tournament that uniquely combines educational and personal development experiences beyond the classroom.

After advancing in the HCASC National Qualifying Tournament in February, Benedict College was one of 32 teams that competed in April on the corporate campus of American Honda in Torrance, Calif., for the HCASC National Championship title and a \$75,000 institutional grant from Honda.

Other members of the team included Charlene A. Hills a junior majoring in English from Plainfield, NJ, Kayla Rolle a senior majoring in English from Freeport, Grand Bahama and Marly Alexandra Pierre a sophomore majoring in Cybersecurity from Roselle, NJ will represent Benedict College. Dr. Brittany F. Morrone will coach the team.

Honda Campus All-Star Challenge is a year-round program celebrating Black excellence and showcasing the academic talents of top HBCU students from across the country. Four-student teams face off in head-to-

head competition and must quickly answer questions about history, science, literature, religion, math, the arts, pop culture, and sports. HCASC challenges students to expand their scope of knowledge on a wide range of topics while also helping to develop their leadership and collaboration skills. With the opportunity to compete against students from other HBCUs, participants build camaraderie, gain mentorship opportunities with HCASC alumni, and make "friends for life." Beyond the competition, Honda provides development seminars aimed at increasing career readiness and student empowerment.

Vincent Sheheen Visits MGT 432 Negotiation Fundamentals

Burroughs Finance Program Receives External Funding

The finance program will receive enhancements starting Fall 2023 thanks to grant funding from JP Morgan Chase & UNCF.

The Above and Beyond the Competition (ABC) Program is a transformational professional pathways program designed to prepare students for first-destination placements and advancement in the global financial services sector.

This program allows the College to leverage the strengths of its Career Development

Services and the Tyrone Adam Burroughs School of Business and Entrepreneurship. Both units

are well positioned to address the high demand for more diverse talent in the banking and finance industry by
equipping finance students with credentials, providing them access to networking events with industry
professionals, and connecting students with internship and employment opportunities in the financial services
industry.

"The banking and finance industry is a global one that requires a workforce reflective of the entire world. Through this grant funding, Benedict College can fulfill the demand for prepared graduates who are ready to work with the skillsets needed to make an impact upon hiring," says Dr. Tracy Washington, chair of the Accounting & Finance Department.

The ABC Program is a 3-year initiative that will allow the business school to acquire training platforms and other resources needed to successfully incorporate the program into the finance coursework.

"The grant funding positions us to create better-equipped finance leaders of tomorrow," says Dr. Tracy Dunn, dean of the Burroughs School of Business & Entrepreneurship.

To qualify for membership in the Beta Gamma Chapter of the International Business Honor Society, Delta Mu Delta (DMD), business students must hold rank in the top 20% of their classes. Delta Mu Delta membership benefits include 1) Lifetime Recognition for Outstanding Academic Achievement, 2) Networking Opportunities, 3) Scholarship Program, and 4) Acknowledgment for Federal Employment.

Delta Mu Delta was founded on November 18, 1913. Five professors from Harvard, Yale, and New York University believed that exceptional students in the field of business should be recognized and rewarded. They founded the Society to provide recognition similar to that given by Phi Beta Kappa in the field of liberal arts.

Delta Mu Delta was incorporated in 1952 and in 1963, was admitted to membership in the Association of Collegiate Honor Societies (ACHS). In 1992, the Delta Mu Delta established an affiliation with the Accreditation

Council for Business Schools and Programs (ACBSP), which requires a school or program to be ACBSP accredited to be eligible for a chapter.



B.E.S.T. Innovation Lab Received National Recognition

The Burroughs Enterprise, Startup, and Technology
(B.E.S.T.) Innovation Lab at Benedict College was awarded the Rising Star Award for Excellence in Student Engagement in Entrepreneurship at the Deshpande Symposium in June 2023. It was selected because the Lab "exemplifies the attributes of a Rising Star with the robust participation and rapid student adoption of entrepreneurial thinking across campus."



B.E.S.T. Innovation Lab Brings Pre-Accelerator to BC

Benedict College is one of 5 HBCUs to join the HBCU Founders Initiative's Pre-Accelerator program. The HBCU Founders Initiative (HBCUFI) is a nonprofit organization that supports HBCU students and alumni along their entrepreneurial journey, and its Pre-Accelerator program provides specialized support to students and alumni exploring entrepreneurship and the launch of tech-fueled ventures across HBCU campuses.

The other 4 new HBCUs on-boarding into HBCUFI's Pre-Accelerator program include Hampton University, Morehouse College, Texas Southern University, and Bethune-Cookman University.

The 5 new institutions join HBCUFI's Fall 2022 inaugural cohort of seven partner HBCUs that include Bowie State University, Elizabeth City State University, Morgan State University, North Carolina A&T University, Oakwood University, Prairie View A&M University, and Spelman College.

This brings HBCUFI's total number of HBCU campus-based cohorts to 12 institutions, with a growing waitlist of schools ready to partner. Prior to launching its inaugural cohort of 7 partner HBCUs in 2022, HBCUFI worked with HBCU students and alumni interested in entrepreneurship through its virtual programming offerings. Over 750 students and alumni from 80+ HBCUs have benefitted from HBCUFI's programming with participants raising over \$2M for their startups.

"HBCUFI is the missing piece of our entrepreneurial community-building package at Benedict College," Dr. Tracy Harrell Dunn, Dean of Benedict College's Burroughs School of Business and Entrepreneurship, and Aaron Taylor, Director of Benedict's B.E.S.T. Innovation Lab said. "Despite the B.E.S.T Lab's remarkable progress, we were missing a Pre-Accelerator experience for our student entrepreneurs that would enable our potential student founders to launch ventures in this competitive market confidently. With HBCUFI, we have that now."

While HBCUFI programming is open to students and alumni from the nation's 100+ HBCUs, the decision to develop direct partnerships with HBCUs allows HBCUFI to further connect with the on-campus ecosystem at HBCUs and host inperson entrepreneurship programs with partnered institutions.

"We are pleased to have 5 additional HBCUs join us in fulfilling our mission to ensure that innovative ideas don't die on the vine because there is no one available to cultivate them," said HBCUFI President, Marlon Evans. "By providing a structured program that connects our participants with executives and entrepreneurs with deep experience building companies, coupled with providing access to pre-seed funding, HBCUFI is helping to build an unprecedented innovation ecosystem on HBCU campuses."

Support from organizations committed to diversity and inclusion has been core to HBCUFI's success. Organizations supporting HBCUFI for its third year include UNCF, AARP, Principal Foundation, Blackstone LaunchPad, UNC Eshelman Institute for Innovation, Costco, Chase for Business, Vistra Corp., Cooley, and the Techstars Foundation.

For the program, each of the 12 partner HBCUs will host two, eight-week Pre-Accelerators (one in the fall and one in the spring) in support of up to eight startups per cohort; all of which are comprised of early-stage founders who are past the ideation stage and ready to validate a problem and build an MVP.

Each Pre-Accelerator program covers topics such as validating the idea, building a prototype, customer discovery, marketing and branding, legal operations, and fundraising and will be presented in weekly virtual cohort sessions with on-campus activities also planned. The program culminates in a pitch competition where participants are eligible to receive non-dilutive program awards in support of MVP development.

Applications for the Fall 2023 Pre-Accelerator program opened on July 1st and closed on August 6^{th} .

B.E.S.T. Innovation Organizes Statewide Forum

The B.E.S.T. Innovation Lab hosted a half-day virtual event exploring the crucial role of higher education in South Carolina's thriving startup ecosystem.

The event opened with an early-bird HBCU session that focused on the unique challenges facing HBCUs in supporting minority entrepreneurs and competing in innovation. This roundtable discussion was an opportunity for HBCU representatives to connect, network, and learn from other leaders in the field. The following HBCUs were represented: Benedict College, Claflin University, SC State University, Allen University, Morris College, and Clinton College.

The main event brought together leaders from higher education institutions, startup accelerators/incubators, and successful startup founders to discuss best practices, strategies, and actionable plans for creating a more collaborative and effective innovation ecosystem in South Carolina.

"This forum was an exciting opportunity to learn more about the crucial role of higher education in the SC innovative ecosystem, connect with other HBCU representatives, and

shape the future of innovation and economic development in our state," says Atty Aaron Taylor, director of the B.E.S.T. Innovation Lab.

The forum featured a keynote welcome from John Hill (Techstars). Nancy Conwell, (South Carolina Department of Commerce) delivered the State of SC Innovation Ecosystem. The forum included a panel discussion on Educational Experience's Impact on the Entrepreneurial Journey featuring Starlitt Miller (Transity), Brett Nilsen (Copyt), Ryan McElhinney (Student-Made Store). The forum ended with a presentation on Higher Education's Role in the Innovation Ecosystem delivered by John Hill (Techstars) as well as a presentation from Ryan McElhinney (Student-Made).

The SC institutions that attended the main event included Benedict College, USC (Columbia), USC (Upstate), Wofford College, Allen University, Bob Jones University, and Clemson University.

B.E.S.T. Innovation Lab Receives Grant Funding

The Howard University & PNC National Center for Entrepreneurship, an innovative and new initiative recently launched to support entrepreneurship at HBCUs and Black business owners across the country, selected the Burroughs Enterprise, Startup, and Technology Innovation Lab as an inaugural recipient of a \$25,000 Entrepreneurship Education Innovation Grant. This grant will support the Lab's efforts to further develop the entrepreneurial ecosystem and offerings on Benedict's campus. The intention of the award is to benefit students, faculty, staff, alumni, and/or the greater community.

placement on either the President's List or the Dean's List. Additionally, he was inducted into Delta Mu Delta, the business school's international business honor society.

Mr. Cooper had a long career of leadership on Benedict's campus. Starting in his sophomore year, he was elected Vice-President of the Burroughs Scholars Program. In his junior year, he held the position of President of the National Association of Black Accountants (NABA) on campus and Vice-President of the Benedict College Honors Program. As a senior, he maintained his leadership roles with the Burroughs Scholars Program and NABA in addition to serving as the president of the Benedict College Honors Program and treasurer of the Collegiate 100.

Mr. Cooper participated annually in the Internal Revenue Service's Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) Program, a program that provides free tax preparation services to the underserved. Additionally, he maintained a commitment to the Harvest Hope Food Bank starting in his freshman year, and using his influence as a leader, organized several food drives on campus.

At the time of graduation, Mr. Cooper was finishing with a 3.95 GPA and having completed two internships with Deloitte US, a company that offers services in audit, advisory, tax, and consulting. His plans after graduation included a return to Deloitte to complete his third internship with the company in Houston, Texas and the Master of Accountancy program at Jackson State University in Jackson, Mississippi.

During his senior year, George served as the treasurer of the Benedict College Tyrone Adam Burroughs School of Business and Entrepreneurship's chapter of the National Association of Black Accountants and was named a Center for Financial Advancement Scholar.

George has professional experience working with Just Elevate, LLC, and Sisters of Charity Foundation of South Carolina. As a senior, he worked as a Finance Analyst Intern at Dominion Energy. Since graduation, he joined Dominion Energy full-time as a financial analyst only 3 days after graduation and was recently featured in a press release from the company.

"Jahavheed is a prime example of the great talent that exists on every HBCU campus," said Tony Elliot,

director of Envision Tomorrow for Dominion Energy and George's supervisor. "The intern program provided the exposure he needed to showcase his immense talents which will benefit the company."

Tyler McAllister was recently promoted to Corn Department Packaging Manager. Tyler joined Frito-Lay in 2022 as a Department Manager Designate where he completed his initial training in the company's accelerated training program intended to accelerate the development of future leaders within PepsiCo. With over 4 years combined experience at Target and Amazon, Tyler's initial onboarding assignment was to learn Frito-Lay packaging. Tyler is also a member of the Perry Site campus recruiting team helping to source new college hires.

McAllister was a member of the inaugural graduation class for the Master of Business Administration Program at Benedict College.

Kelly Nixon ('23, business administration – marketing)

Kelly Nixon represented the business school at the HBCU Energy Leadership Pathways program. This program is a collaboration between the historically black colleges and universities in the Carolinas and a wide variety of companies in the energy industry. The objective is to increase the number of students at the participating schools who train for and seek careers in the energy industry.

Many students from marginalized communities are unaware of the opportunity for rewarding careers in the energy industry, so the pathway is



structured in three phases from first-year through graduation and beyond. The Pathway is designed to operate in parallel with a four-year undergraduate program to provide participating students with experience and credentials for a successful career in the energy industry.

In December 2020 a group of Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) and energy companies in the Carolinas convened a Council to create a leadership pathway for HBCU students to the energy industry. Participating Pathway students prepare for energy industry leadership careers beginning in their freshman year. They acquire experience and credentials in addition to their regular education making them particularly attractive to energy industry employers. Students represent all disciplines of interest to the energy industry, not just engineering and technical disciplines.

Prof. Michele Dugar completed Advanced Teaching and Learning Studio (2.0) from Stanford University. This program is for educators and administrators who previously completed the school's Teaching & Learning Studio (TLS) program. It covers new approaches to practicing and teaching design that enable attendees to level up as innovative educators.

To fulfill the requirements of the program, Prof. Dugar conducted three in-context experiments with the support of a design coach, small coaching group and the larger TLS 2.0 cohort, using the concepts and frameworks introduced.

Dean Tracy H. Dunn

Dean Dunn was a co-presenter the Annual Accreditation Council for Business Schools and Programs (ACBSP) Conference in Chicago in July 2023. She delivered the presentation - *Innovative Engagement of Gen Z* – alongside colleague, Dr. Daryl Green, associate professor of marketing at Oklahoma Baptist University. Their presentation won "Best of Region" in Region 6.

Additionally, Dean Tracy H. Dunn was selected as inaugural Faculty Fellow by the Howard University & PNC National Center for Entrepreneurship (HUxPNC Center), an innovative initiative recently launched to support entrepreneurship at HBCUs and Black business owners across the country.

This program specifically supports HBCU faculty members who contribute to the Center's mission of empowering Black entrepreneurship through research and scholarship. This fellowship included a stipend in support of Dean Dunn's research project that will examine the state of entrepreneurship education at South Carolina's HBCUs.

Dean Dunn was recognized along with the other inaugural Faculty Fellows at the HUxPNC Center's National Conference, June 14-16, 2023, in Washington, D.C.

Dr. Ebuta Ekure, an associate professor of business administration and the inaugural department chair for the business school, retired from Benedict College on May 12. 
